FROM THE RECTOR

Greetings to you in Christ.

There is a lovely canticle in *The Book of Common Prayer* called "A Song of Creation", which comes from the *Song of the Three Young Men*, an apocryphal portion of the Old Testament book of Daniel. You may recall the story of "Daniel and the fiery furnace"—how Daniel and his three friends, living in exile in Babylon, refused to worship king Nebuchadnezzar's golden statue, and so were thrown into a furnace of blazing fire. As they walk into the flames, they all begin to sing an elaborate song "as with one mouth," praising God for all the glories of creation.

And right in the middle of their song, they sing this line:

Glorify the Lord, O chill and cold, drops of dew and flakes of snow. Frost and cold, ice and sleet, glorify the Lord, praise him and highly exalt him for ever.

I have been thinking a lot about this verse lately—no doubt due to all the snowy weather we have received this year. For some, frost and cold and flakes of snow conjure idyllic scenes: children sledding, snow days, hot cocoa, and fires in fireplaces. For others, they represent danger and desperation: icy paths, scarcity of nourishment, and a constant struggle to keep warm amidst failing electricity or none at all (our neighbors in Texas are especially struggling with this right now). I am normally inclined to think about these elements as, essentially, neutral phenomena, which we may either choose to bless or curse depending on our unique circumstances.

But perhaps that is a wrong way of thinking. Perhaps I should think about them as creatures, like me, whose very existence in the world is itself a giving of glory to God—irrespective of anything else. The chill and cold glorifies the Lord not because it is useful, or even desirable, but simply because *it is*. Likewise, you and I—"men and women everywhere," in the words of the song—give glory to God not because we are especially good or talented or wonderful people (though we may very well be!). We glorify the Lord because *we are*. Whether we intend to glorify God in our lives, or whether that is the furthest thing from our minds, our givenness as creatures will do it all the same. The whole earth sings the praises of God. The whole earth is full of his glory.

I take peace in that thought. There is nothing that I nor anyone else can ever do that will thwart the glory of God in the world. Even the frost and the cold, and the ice and the snow sing the praise of God's glory.

Perhaps that is a word that might warm our hearts on a cold winter's night, till the snow melts away and the flowers appear on the earth, and the music of the birdsong is heard once again.

Stories from the Archives



BAPTISM

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is our entrance into the Body of Christ as members of our one Holy Catholic Church.

Through our Baptism we are entitled to participate fully in the life of the church. Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the day of Pentecost (50 days after the Easter Vigil), on All Saints Day (November 1) and on the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord (First Sunday after the Epiphany, January 6). Baptism can also be arranged at other times, in consultation with the priest. Please call the church office at 215.348.5511.

MARRIAGE

Because the decision is such an important one, we at Saint Paul's are very serious about the priestly and canonical responsibilities for presiding at a marriage. To be married at Saint Paul's, each couple must meet the basic requirements established by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church, The Diocese of Pennsylvania and the customs and practices of this parish.
